GRCC President Letter



It's a Dilemma - F2F Hybrid or Zoom Only?

Despite our successful return to Face-to-Face (F2F) meetings in October... our next two program speakers will be visiting us via Zoom since they are not local. The Board has voted to conduct our November and December meetings via Zoom only. Personally, I have mixed feelings about this decision... weighing the pros and cons is a dilemma.



I frequently get feedback from our members. I know there are many club members who will be disappointed by the Zoom only decision. They don't care for Zoom meetings for a variety of reasons and want to attend in-person. There are also members who rather like the Zoom platform because they can attend from the comfort of their home and don't have deal with travel, or they are not yet comfortable with F2F gatherings. In addition, we have out of town members that couldn't easily be part of the club without Zoom.

The Board will be meeting in early November and I can assure you that resuming Face-to-Face meetings (with a Zoom option) starting in January 2022 is on the agenda. We will also be discussing the resumption of our monthly Print Competition at the same time. It's the start of the new year, and, barring a huge spike in infections, my hope is that a new year will allow us to begin with a fresh mindset

The Pandemic has changed the playing field permanently. For GRCC it has changed how we judge our monthly competition, how the Club and Board meets, and even more importantly WHO we can invite to speak and share their photographic expertise with us. Zoom has allowed us to easily record our programs and make them available after the fact. Each of those changes have forced us to think outside the box, and each have pros and cons. The hybrid meeting model will definitely be in our plans as we move forward. It's not too hard to do and opens up the club with options for everyone to attend.

On the flip side, hybrid meetings require additional technical support to make them happen, and at least for November and December of 2021, we do not have the background technical support to make it a reality. Assuming the Board approves moving forward with F2F starting January 2022, we will use these few months to adjust for the technical hurdles.

Creating Your Image Title

I love creative titles! Even though the title is not part of what the judge bases his/her score on, sometimes it helps the judge to understand the photo. Often titles are quite cute and entertaining. It's like in the courtroom, once the jury hears something, and told to ignore it, it's really hard to 'unhear'. Good titles can help your score. So keep naming your images creatively.

There are a couple of things regarding titles to remember:

Photojournalism

If it is a photojournalism entry, you should not need its title to explain the story of the photo. The story should be apparent to the judge just by looking at the image.

Length of Title

You must keep your titles to a reasonable length. The guidelines in the membership manual state that the title cannot be more than 28 characters, including spaces. When completing the competition records and scoresheets created for posting on the website, I need to fit everything on one page - Category, Title, Your Name, Score, and Division. When the fields are too long, I am forced to shorten to fit the space I have available. Sometimes I need to abbreviate your name.

You might ask: What exactly counts for the 28 characters? I am only talking about what you name it. NOT the underscores, or file format (so don't count this).

Count this – the actual title of the image including the spaces between the words. This one is exactly 28 characters and spaces.

ABOUT MY IMAGE:

This image depicts the SS Arthur M. Anderson, a cargo ship of the Laker type. It was captured as she made her way through Lake Superior waters. The Arthur Anderson is famous for being the last ship to be in contact with the SS Edmund Fitzgerald before that ore carrier sank on 10 November, 1975. The Arthur M. Anderson was also the first rescue ship on the scene in a vain search for Edmund Fitzgerald survivors.

One of the more popular current theories as to what it was specifically that took the Fitzgerald to the bottom is known as the "Three Sisters Theory." It proposes that the ship succumbed to the power of two monstrous seas, possibly followed by a third major wave. Of the first two waves there is ample evidence, because they are the ones that struck the Anderson before the Fitzgerald went down. The theory holds that there might have been a third major wave striking the Fitzgerald at the same time.

But, as is the case with all such theories, it is unlikely we will ever know the whole story behind what caused this shipwreck.

I added a bit of drama to the skies and water ... and felt the story in my image would benefit from the yellow sky-line depicting hope and help for the Fitz, which was not to be found in this tragic story of search without rescue.

When I think of the assigned subject, nautical, I think of happy, little sailboats. This image was a completely different take on the nautical theme. When I look at it, I feel the mood. The water looks icy, the lake choppy and angry. Storm clouds loom ominously with slivers of sunlight showing through. As I look at the image, I can hear Gordon Lightfoot's song "The Wreck of the Edmund Fitzgerald" playing in my head as I imagine the icy winds of Lake Superior in winter. Very well done.


