# February 16th Meeting Year End Competition Awards for 2021


**Lights & Shadows**

## The Judges for our Year End Competition

### JOHN FLEMING

John M. Fleming began a photographer's journey that included many travels with his family to the Upper Peninsula of Michigan and the Western United States. This childhood hobby exploded into a full-blown passion creating a firm foundation for his second career. His travels have taken him all over the US and Canada. Much has evolved since John's early days with a camera, and much remains the same. His love of nature and wildlife continue to be the central theme of his work. He shoots with Nikon equipment and strives for purity in the images he shoots.

Living in the small lakeshore town of Douglas Michigan, this tranquil setting inspires and motivates John both personally and professionally. In 2004 he retired from corporate finance to pursue his dream of Fine Art Nature Photography.

His work has appeared in publications including Birder's World, Michigan Natural Resources, Michigan Audubon Society's The Jack-Pine Warbler and Wyoming Wildlife.

### DIANNE CARROL BURDICK

Dianne Carroll Burdick, a Western Michigan University graduate with a BFA in Photography, is a free-lance photographer in West Michigan. Her clients have included Park Township in Ottawa County, USA Today, TIME magazine, The Grand Rapids Press, Grand Valley State University, the Grand Rapids Art Museum, Grand Rapids Community College, the Grand Rapids Symphony, the Public Museum of Grand Rapids, United Way, The Salvation Army, School News Network and Opera Grand Rapids. She has been a Photography Instructor at Grand Rapids Community College and also as a Continuing Studies Instructor at Kendall College of Art and Design where she taught Digital Photography. She gives workshops at Lowell Arts Council and Frederic Meijer Gardens. She has participated in over fifty art exhibitions and her work is included in six books and several corporate and private collections. Dianne is the recipient of fifty awards in Photography. Her images are on the Grammy-nominated CD of Debra Henson-Conent with the Grand Rapids Symphony. Her book Listen to the Landscape was released in August of 2006, a collection of twenty-eight hand-colored photographs, with haiku by Linda Nemec Foster, and published by Eerdmans Publishing, in it's 2nd edition. She provided the images for the CD Treasures From the Great Lakes, Music for Bassoon, Horn and Piano, released in July of 2009. This was also a multi-media presentation that was performed / viewed throughout that year. Her book, Tasting and Touring Michigan's Homegrown Food, A Culinary Road Trip, holds over 250 images of Michigan and was published May 2012 by Arbutus Press, written by Jaye Beeler. Her latest book, Antique Apples, was published in the Fall of 2015 featuring Michigan apples, Arbutus Press.

A big view camera, massive tripod, frozen wet plate exposure material, really heavy gloves, and snacks all carried on snowshoes? Maybe photography was a seasonal pursuit. Darkroom manipulation was probably the activity during November, December, January, February, March and April (in Michigan).

Oh wait, have I just described your winter photography routine? Are you exhausted from shoveling and only up to a little post-processing on your computer? That of course, has its own side effects: eye strain, poor posture, carpal tunnel syndrome, etc. not to mention weight gain.



How might one break out of the seasonal photography dilemma? Go to a warmer climate – maybe, if it's in your budget? Another possibility that almost ALL club members might try is my patented super-duper winter outdoor photography kit on sale, today only for \$???. The "Editing Challenge" is an off shoot of a program done by James Zeman, Steve Port, and Russ Barneveld. In the program we each took three RAW images that were supplied by a club member. Each of us gave the images our own twist, using our post-processing software programs.

Following the program, we decided it would be fun to continue the challenge with other club members. Each month those who participated were sent a RAW image that they were to edit in their own style. Members were encouraged to be as creative as wanted without worrying about judges, scores, and points. Much like "Planet Fitness" we consider this group to be a "No Judgement Zone".

Now that we have a new year, we have decided to shake things up a bit. We are still going to try to challenge you and we'll still be editing. Most importantly, there still will be no judgment. We look at this activity as a learning experience, a way to improve our skills, and share our work with others.

In the new version of the challenge, we plan to make each month a different activity. Participants will have a chance to share their work, try new techniques with their cameras, and learn new editing skills.

We plan to kick-off our new look in March. Below you can find a list of the challenges we'll be doing. We also plan to add some tutorials and demos to help you with the next challenge.

Horizontal or Vertical Panoramas


