

Interview: Richard Coombs

Richard, can you give our GRCC members some background information on yourself?

What kind of photography do you like to do?



I am interested in almost any and every category of photography and am always open to photographing any new or untried genre. I'm well equipped with Nikon cameras and lenses, including two Mirrorless Z cameras (FX & DX) and two DSLR cameras (FX & DX.) If I was pressed to narrow down my favorite photography categories they would be creative, monochrome, and any type of outdoor images. I prefer to shoot in raw and edit later.

As a photographer, what advice can you give others in the club to help them with their photography?

Secondly, if possible, always try to have your "go-to" camera and lens close at hand for unplanned photo opportunities.

GRCC is the oldest continuous running camera club in the USA, and that speaks volumes for every aspect of this organization and leadership throughout its long, successful history. Emphasizing monthly competition may or may not be important to all individual GRCC members but it has been an important part of this club, as a whole, for many years, and in my opinion, should remain in both the print and digital categories. Finally, I would like to show my support for GRCC offering more workshops face-to-face, online, or in the form of photo outings. It's a great venue for new ideas and personal growth.

ABOUT MY IMAGE:

This image was captured during the first GRCC Scavenger Hunt Team challenge held in 2016. One of the hunt categories was Athlete and it was one of my favorite images. I made it during that challenge, and it was chosen as my team's entry for the category. It was early spring, and I attended a track meet at East Grand Rapids High School to see if I could catch some athletic action. EGR's track is unique in that it is small and compact. The viewing stands are not set back far from the perimeter of the track, so getting close is not a problem. For sports such as long or high jump you can stand directly next to the action. I was using a Tamron 70-200 f2.8 lens with a 1.4x teleconverter and my settings were 1/800 sec at f8.0, ISO 2000 at 280mm. The image included a few other athletes, but their body positions were awkward and distracting, so I cropped the image to highlight this young lady's "Focused Determination."

The Edit Challenge For April

HORIZONTAL OR VERTICAL PANORAMAS

Most cell phones do a great job of creating a panoramic image, but have you tried doing one with your "real" camera? Maybe you've shot a "normal" panoramic, but have you tried doing a vertical (vertorama) shot? Why not try doing both a vertical and horizontal shot? Now's your chance to give it a try in our "No Judgement Zone"!

In addition to learning how to setup a panoramic shot on your camera you will also learn how to do the post processing. Most of the popular editing programs have a panoramic stitching feature so here's your chance to learn how to do it with your software. If your software doesn't do stitching, then check out one of the free programs that are available:




The Exposure Triangle

A photographic image's exposure is the product of the camera ISO adjustment or film selection, the aperture of the lens, and the speed of the shutter. This combination of factors is referred as the exposure triangle. As one is changed, it effects the other two in order to provide the correct exposure.

When a photographer exposes an image with the camera on an automatic mode, no knowledge or decisions are required as far as the exposure process. All decisions are



under the control of the programmer at the camera design factory except for the ISO setting. The other two elements of exposure control are limited to the rigid program of the camera design.

When the photographer uses either the Aperture Preferred Mode or the Shutter Preferred Mode, now the photographer greatly expands control over the exposure. Two of the three parameters are under the control of the photographer. Using Aperture Preferred Mode, the photographer can control the depth of field image (i.e. throw the background out of focus). With Shutter Preferred Mode, the photographer can control how movement is handled (i.e. frozen movement).

If the photographer uses the Manual Mode of the camera, the photographer has the full control and capabilities of the camera and lens. The combination of the aperture, shutter speed, and ISO gives the photographer full creative control of the image's depth of field and how motion is handled under the lighting conditions available.

For instance, if a scene is metered for f/11 at 1/60 of a second using an ISO of 100, the chart below shows all other combinations for aperture and shutter speed will give the EXACT same exposure. Only the depth of field and how motion is handled will differ in the images:

	IS0 = 100								
APERTURE	f/2.0	f/2.8	f/4.0	f/5.6	f/8.0	f/11.0	f/16.0	f/22.0	f/32.0
SHUTTER SPEED	1/2,000th	1/1,000th	1/500th	1/250th	1/125th	1/60th	1/30th	1/15th	1/8th

By changing the ISO for the same lighting conditions, a whole new set of choices become available.
