Your Photography Can Be Seen In Print, Online and Competitions

Terabytes Of Images

I suspect that I am not alone among photographers in having many terabytes of images tucked away on my computer (with multiple backup copies to external hard drives as a safety net). This hobby of ours (and for some a source of income) is, in many ways, an addiction. Non-photographers don't understand why we take hundreds of images... and I will admit that sometimes I ask myself the same question. For me, it is the excitement of the chase. Trying to capture that perfect moment and freezing it in time. Yes, I could take a video... (which in case you haven't noticed videos have overtaken still images on social media). But for me that perfect frame is much more of a challenge than a video. But... I digress.

Should Be Shared

My point is that we all have LOTS of images amassed over months, years, or decades. Like me, many of you spend hours editing your images. Are you the only one who ever sneaks a peak at them on your computer? What do you do with your images? I think pictures are meant to be shared. After all, there was something that caught your eye and caused you to raise your camera (or phone) and snap the shutter button... and that should be shared!

Pay It Forward

So where can you share your images? Here are some ideas that might get your creative juices going. Find something that works for you and start sharing your creative work with others! I am certain that at one time or another you have seen an image that has inspired you. You can do the same and "pay it forward."

Show It Off In Many Ways... In Print!

- **1. Make a photo book** so you have something physical to hold and share with friends. It would make a great gift to share with others who may have accompanied you on that holiday. The internet abounds with places to create books... or you can do it the old-fashioned way by printing the images and putting them in a traditional photo album.
- **2. Print your images** and hang them on the wall, gift them, or even sell them.
- 3. Make a calendar of your favorite images and give it as a holiday gift.

4. Print your images on notecards for your own personal use or to give as gifts. These days you can put your images on a host of products, ranging from mugs to jigsaw puzzles. Check out any printer (such as Photo EVO) for options.

Online - Social Media and Websites

- 1. Of course, you can **post them to Facebook, or Instagram, Flickr**, or some other social network to share with family, friends, and followers. For many of us, this has become the main way we share our images.
- **2. Maintain an online gallery** with your own website, or purchase gallery space online with something like SmugMug, or Flickr.
- 3. Submit a selection of your best images to be posted in a **member gallery on the**GRCC club website http://grcameraclub.org/galleries. You can find details on how to do this here:

- **4. Get involved with a photo challenge group**... such as 52 Frames (our January Program will introduce us to this challenge group) or National Geographic's Your Best Shot.

Competitions, Contests, Gallery Shows

- 1. One of the benefits of GRCC membership is **participation in our monthly competition.**This is a perfect way to share your images with others who appreciate photography. Some photographers are intimidated by the word "competition." Yes, there are judges and a score is assigned. However, if you approach it **for the opportunity**, not for the numbers, then ultimately, our monthly competition is about **sharing** your best images.
- 2. If the thought of competition really turns you off, consider a visit to Grand Valley Artists Photo Group. They meet on the first Tuesday of every month. Participants submit a max of 4 images and share with those in attendance any background information. Contact Randy Nyhof (r.nyhof@comcast.net) for details. Another group which you can use to expand your photography options is the Second Tuesday Photo Huddle, organized by GRCC member Michael Koole. - **3.** Participate in Photo Contests and Competitions. These abound everywhere and there are big ones many of us have heard about... Smithsonian, National Geographic, Audubon, National Wildlife Federation. The images submitted are always awe-inspiring. Outdoor Photographer sponsors numerous contests during the year. If you are a member of Photographic Society of America (PSA) or NANPA they also run competitions. 

If those venues are too big for you, seek out some smaller "ponds" to dip your toes into such as GR Festival of the Arts, Michigan Audubon, Detroit News Celebrate Michigan Photo contest, Scenic Michigan Photo Contest.

Entry rules, fees, and prizes are variable from one contest to another. Be sure to read the details and fully understand if you are relinquishing any rights to your photograph.

4. Participate in a Gallery Show. There is great satisfaction in seeing your images IN PRINT... not just on the computer screen. GRCC intends to offer the opportunity for members to participate in a gallery showing during 2023. I have recently joined Grand Valley Artists and have had the opportunity to participate in several gallery shows in the area through GVA and it is very satisfying.

Steve Port's **Timed Exposure** A Bit of Photography History

Wildlife Progress



After an exhausting day of hauling an enormous Box Camera up one hill and down the other, a lone landscape photographer (in around 1850) stops to make camp for the night. Sadly, the fading golden evening light is simply too weak to stimulate the emulsion without many seconds of exposure. Sad because, as he looks out 150 yards, he sees a magnificent bull elk, the size of which, he has never witnessed. A fantastic trophy moving way too fast for his slow, ancient camera and too far away for his relatively short lens.

Forward to 2005, an ardent landscape enthusiast makes camp before nightfall and the freezing temperatures which will surely follow. 150 yards away an amazing bull elk breaks cover. His rack is larger than anything this photographer has ever seen before. Grabbing his weather sealed, pro-grade DSLR with 'high speed' color film and 500mm f8 telephoto lens, he prays that the elk will pause as he struggles to position his tripod for the inevitable very low golden light. The paltry low ASA film will be challenged by the ensuing darkness but, perhaps, some push process of the film may provide an acceptable image, maybe.

It's 2022 and a couple, sporting a Sony Alpha 1/FE 600mm f4 combo and a Cannon R3/RF 800 f5.6 package, have hiked and shot most of the day to arrive at this high altitude meadow. Looks like they will set up camp using headlamps tonight. No sense in missing the sunset/golden hour. They stop in their tracks as an utterly enormous bull elk strides from the bushes 150 yards away. The elk is unafraid but is aware of the intrepid couple so he continues away at a slow pace only pausing briefly for a mouthful of scrumptious whatever. No time for tripods but ISO 12,800 and a relatively fast 1/1000 sec. shutter speed and 5 stops of camera stabilization provide tack sharp image after image at 20+ frames/sec. A pretty good evening no matter what else they find. Should do well at camera club. They like animals.

How far we've come. Happy shooting!




