Photography has always been an integral part of my life, whether documenting my family, recording family vacations, exploring the world, or creating art. I discovered GRCC in 2009 by a web search, attended a meeting and joined immediately. It was empowering to find a group of individuals who shared my passion for photography and I have learned and grown so much by being a part of this organization.

Why? Because I got involved. It is part of my personality, but whatever organization I join, I often end up in a position of leadership.... happened at my place of worship, PTA, arts organizations, the Quilting Guild, Audubon club, and GRCC. I am happy to give back to an organization because in giving I help the organization, but I also receive much back in rewards.

Leading GRCC (or any organization) through the pandemic has been a huge challenge. I did the best I could navigating waters that none of us had experience with. It wasn't perfect, but GRCC has emerged on the other side.

Not one club member has stepped up to fill either position, or any board position for that matter. Those who are on the 2023-24 slate as officers or board members, are re-upping for a position they already hold (and I thank them for that!)

I have served as President for 2 terms (4 years), and prior to that 2 terms (4 years) as

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Programming VP. I have the utmost respect for Diane Durand who served as GRCC President for SIX TERMS.... that is 12 years!!! Thank you, Diane for your dedication and service to the club. Likewise, thank you to Jeanne Quillan who has served as our Competition VP for longer than I have been a member. Our Treasurer Christine Mooney, our newsletter editor Greg Ferguson, and digital coordinator Shealyn McGee-Sarns have also held those positions for many years, for which I am most thankful. Yet, new ideas often come from "new blood."

GRCC has been in existence for over 100 years – 2024 will be our 125th Anniversary (we were founded in 1899)! If GRCC is to move forward in 2024 and beyond, we need members willing to step into leadership roles.

ABOUT MY IMAGE:

I captured this image in March 2023 while on a private workshop with Paul Rossi in Michigan's Upper Peninsula. Sharp-tailed Grouse congregate in late winter to early spring on snow packed breeding grounds called "leks" where the males perform a mating ritual for several hours each morning right after dawn. We were in blinds with tripods and gimbal heads and about 20 birds were approximately 20-50 feet in front of us . The males start to spar between each other, and eventually one lunges at the other, and then they are airborne, feathers, feet and bodies often intertwined. The fights are generally extremely short (less than 5 seconds) so I had to really stay focused and learn the bird's behavior to anticipate when a fight would occur. I was shooting in manual with auto ISO and my 500 mm f/4 prime lens. Minimum shutter speeds to stop the action were 1/4000 sec and as the light became clearer, I adjusted shutter up to 1/8000 sec. Some of my images were captured at ISO's as high as 20,000! You need good noise reduction software to help with ISOs that high. The animal eye tracking capabilities of my Canon R5 were critical to success. I took thousands of images and ended up with a few real gems like this one.

Knowing that I would be selecting the Image of the Month, once I laid eyes on this image, I knew it was "the one." As a lover of nature and in particular photos of birds, this image took my breath away. One can feel the battle, the anger and the determination to win! A difficult-to-get action shot, the birds are sharply in focus and the neutral back-ground compliments the subjects. Catching the birds in mid-air with great composition is truly a photographic feat. Kudos to the photographer.

My love of nature inspired many attempts at drawing, sketching. I tried so hard in art classes! My lack of eye to hand talent was a hard pill to swallow.

My subsequent adult career trajectory carried me far away from my potentially artistically creative side.

Today, I merge my photography and business worlds with client projects and content services. Working with individuals and small businesses, it's privilege to problem solve, use imagery and develop messaging and support others.


I enjoy helping others grow in their photography journey through group and individual workshops. Maybe even inspire their gradual interest to their own definition of obsession.

- Entries must originate as photographs. Photographs are defined as images captured using light sensitive cameras.
- All entries and edits must be the photographer's own work.
- Entries may not be completely created within the computer and must be based on a photo taken by the maker.
- A photo of someone else's artwork (for example a photo from a wall mural, an illustration from a book or an image copied from the web) is NOT acceptable.
